Course Overview

This beginner-level music theory course provides students with a comprehensive introduction to the fundamental principles of music theory. Designed for individuals with little to no prior musical experience, the course aims to cultivate a solid foundation in understanding the language of music. Through a combination of theoretical concepts, practical exercises, and interactive discussions, students will develop the skills necessary to read and analyze musical notation, comprehend basic harmony, and grasp essential concepts in reading, writing, playing, and thinking about music.

Course materials/resources

There is no required textbook for this course. New course content will be introduced primarily in the form of lectures; supplemental materials will also be posted to the Canvas course site.

You will want to have music paper (paper with a printed five-line musical staff) handy during lectures and sections. You may also and it useful for completing your homework. Music paper can be purchased inexpensively from various retailers. Alternatively, you can print your own: http://blanksheetmusic.net.

This course requires you to work independently with a piano. The music department's piano lab is located in CPMC 166 and will be available to Music 1A students for practice during the following times:

- Mondays, 2:00–4:00pm
- Tuesdays, 1:00–2:00pm
- Thursdays, 1:00–2:00pm
- Fridays, 4:00–6:00pm

The lab has 15 electronic keyboards with headphones that can be used on a first-come, first-served basis. You may work independently; on Tuesdays and Thursdays, you can also ask for instructor assistance if you need it.

Additionally, there are rooms with upright pianos on the third floor of CPMC which you can use for piano practice. They are open from 8:00am–10:00pm, Monday through Friday. Sign-up sheets are posted on Monday mornings for the entire week.

Students are expected to help maintain these facilities in a clean and orderly fashion. Sanitation materials will be provided; please wipe down all touched surfaces upon arrival and when leaving.

You may find a metronome useful for rhythm practice: http://virtualsheetmusic.com/metronome. There are also free metronome apps available for mobile devices.

Learning objectives

Throughout this course, our goals are to support your growth in the following aspects:

- Enhancing Listening Skills: We will introduce and practice fundamental aural skills, enabling you to immerse yourself in music more comprehensively and profoundly.
- Grasping Musical Notation and Vocabulary: Our emphasis will be on fundamental tools derived from Western musical traditions from the 17th century onward. These tools will not only enhance your musical understanding and thinking but also aid in expressing musical ideas. They might also prepare you for further theory courses in the Music Department, such as Music 1B and 1C.
- Enhancing Vocal Abilities: We strive to boost your confidence and ease in using your natural musical instrument—your voice. This effort could set you on a path of lifelong musical enjoyment and fulfillment.
- Developing Piano Keyboard Familiarity: The piano will serve as a practical reference for a variety of theoretical concepts and hands-on exercises, providing a tangible aspect to our pursuit of the mentioned objectives.

Summary of Assignments & Projects

1) Homework (8 x 4% = 32% of final grade)

On most weeks, you will be given a short homework assignment (eight in total throughout the quarter). Each homework will engage with concepts covered that week by completing a series of exercises. You may also be asked to write a brief journal-style reflection. Homework will be submitted on canvas, either filled out by and scanned, or completed annotated digitally and uploaded. You may need to use music paper. Homework will be posted on Tuesday morning and due the following Tuesday (one week later).

2) Final reflection (8% of final grade)

During week 10, you will submit a brief concluding essay. You will be asked to reflect on what you have learned in this course, and if/how you feel your experience of music has changed. You will also write about a piece of music, placing your subjective reactions in dialogue with theoretical notions discussed in the course. More information about the final reflection will be made available in the second half of the quarter (after the midterm exam).

3) <u>Individual musicianship coaching</u> (4 + 6 + 10% = 20% of final grade)

During weeks 4, 7, and 10, you will have a 3-5 minute, one-on-one musicianship coaching with your TA instead of a regular section. During this coaching, you will be asked to sing one or more short melodies and demonstrate working familiarity with the piano keyboard. For the final coaching you will be asked to prepare and perform a song (or part of a song) that you have composed yourself. Your TA will give you on-the-spot feedback, and they may invite you to try something again in light of their comments.

Having a successful coaching doesn't necessarily mean avoiding the smallest errors, but it *does* mean practicing the material in advance and having a strong enough grasp of it such that your TA can give you meaningful feedback. This course does not require you to be a perfect singer, but to use your voice as a tool for learning. Specific musical materials/requirements for each coaching will be distributed to you in advance to practice.

4) Midterm exam (10% of final grade)

This is a written exam on theory/terminology covered in the first half of the quarter. The exam will have two components: a timed quiz, and a worksheet similar in format to your homework assignments. The exam will be administered asynchronously via Canvas. Both components will be published to the Canvas course site at the start of the exam day, and you will need to complete both of them by the following morning.

5) Final exam (15% of final grade)

This is a written exam on all theory/terminology covered throughout the quarter. The format and method of administering the exam will parallel that of the midterm exam.

6) Attendance + Course participation (15% of final grade)

Music is an often communal experience, and as such, we expect that you will be an active member of this course. Attendance will be taken at all TA sections, and your active participation in section will be valued and appreciated. If you need to miss a section due to illness or other

such circumstances, please get in touch with your TA. I encourage you to attend lectures in person as well, especially so that you can ask questions and participate in interactive activities.
